Scenario 1:



4. He gets on the internet and searches for the site.



7. He reads another page and learns more. There are some games on the site that are interesting and tickles his curiosity.


8. As he is helping his parent load the car, he tells them everything he has learned about Benny. He cannot wait to see Benny again and learn about his trip to China.




Scenario 2:

- 4. As he reads, he learns more about Uncle tom and his family.




- 5. Excited, he shows his mother what he has found.
